THE *running* BOARD REPORT

Much of the time spent at Board meetings involves the financials of your club. Expenses continuously rise and we are constantly looking for ways to cut or eliminate costs to you. To that end, your Board of Directors has voted (unanimously) to sell the office building in Garden City, Michigan. We have no plans to occupy another space at this time, but the building has been virtually vacant for several years with no changes predicted for the foreseeable future. The contents are safely stored and monies will be placed in an interest bearing account separate from our general treasury.

Are you aware that if your club is a "mixed" region of MARC members, MAFCA members and members with no affiliation that ONLY members of MARC are covered by our liability insurance? Region members with no MARC membership number cannot be considered part of MARC and therefore are not covered. While it's true that liability lawsuits are rare and unlikely, costs can be in the millions of dollars if you're sued and lose. MARC is proud to guarantee coverage to all its dues paying members as part of their payment. Speak with your non-MARC members soon and advise them of one of the benefits of MARC membership—the generous liability insurance program!

REMEMBER to make mid-season adjustments to your brakes, timing, and fluids. If you haven't greased the chassis in a couple of years, take advantage of the next nice day and spend some time with the undercarriage of your favorite car or truck (your Model A, of course!), and get those fittings cleaned and lubricated for the rest of the season. While you're there, check for rusted or missing cotter pins, corroded electrical connections (battery ground, stoplight switch) and oil drips from engine, transmission or rear axle. Your car will appreciate it!

COMPATIBILITY with today's traffic can be a daunting task while driving a Model A. For the safety of you and your passengers, why not consider installing seat belts and directional signals if you haven't done so already—if you have, offer to help a fellow club member with their installation. The LED lighting systems are easy to install, are reasonably priced from our advertised vendors, and could save your life! Of course, seat belts are also life savers, but will need to be custom installed.

Fashions of 1920s & 1930s



1920's and '30s men's shirt styles were characterized by long, sharp "spear point" collars, bold colors (green, burgundy, yellow), and patterns like stripes, checks, and plaids, often made from cotton broadcloth. While classic white and blue remained common for business, the decade introduced more casual, soft-collared shirts and colorful sportswear, along with functional workwear shirts and early polo styles. Dress Shirts were tailored to fit with long collars, often paired with wide-shouldered suits. They featured single or convertible cuffs, ideal for cufflink use. Sport Shirts featured wide, open collars, sometimes with short sleeves, popular for leisure. (from Village

Three Model A Fords to the Finger Lakes: A Columbus Model A Club Adventure

-From the trip log of Mike Brown-

Six members of the Columbus Indiana Model A Club pointed their three faithful Model A Fords east on Friday May 8, and began the kind of journey that feels almost too good for modern times. John Prohaska and Ron Lawson rode in one car, Tim and Frieda Howell in another, and Dennis Meyer with Mike Brown in the third. Their destination was the Finger Lakes Region of New York, where they would join fellow enthusiasts for the Model A Restorer's Club 2026 National Tour and Membership Meet. But long before they reached Penn Yan, the trip had already become something bigger than a drive on a calendar. It was a rolling adventure, powered by old engines, good humor, and the sort of companionship that only grows stronger mile after mile.

The first two days on the road set the tone. There were lunches in Ohio, an overnight in Wooster, a stop at a fiber arts shop in Kinsman, and then the welcome sight of Jamestown, New York, by evening. By Sunday they had reached Penn Yan, the heart of their Finger Lakes stay, where lunch at Lake Life

Brewery and dinner at the Main Deck marked the end of a long but satisfying approach. From there the trip unfolded like a scrapbook of Americana. They visited the Glenn Curtiss Museum in Hammondsport, the Underwood Museum in downtown Penn Yan, and the Finger Lakes Boating Museum. They attended the MARC general membership meeting, explored Corning Museum of Glass, and even steered their Model A's around Watkins Glen International Raceway—an unforgettable moment when cars built for country roads found themselves circling one of the most famous tracks in America. Another day carried them to Seneca Falls and the "It's a Wonderful Life" Museum, with one final farewell banquet bringing together the broader touring group in a fitting close to the official event.

Of course, no true old-car story is complete without a little drama. The return trip began smoothly enough, with the group leaving Penn Yan and tracing their way back through Pennsylvania and Ohio.





Then, on Saturday morning near Garrettsville, Ohio trouble announced itself with a burning smell from Dennis Meyer's engine, followed soon after by a hard knock that could not be ignored. John Prohaska went to work diagnosing the problem the old-fashioned way, checking each cylinder until the group concluded that Dennis's Model A should go no farther under its own power.

After several unsuccessful attempts to get help through AAA, assistance arrived from John's fellow MARC board member Josh Madden, who trailered the disabled car to safety in Ravenna. Luggage was divided between the remaining two cars, Dennis joined John and Ron, and Mike rode on with

Tim and Frieda. It was a moment that revealed the real strength of the trip: not merely the machinery, but the people.

By the time the club reached Marysville, Ohio for the night and then finally rolled back into Indiana the next day, they had done more than attend a national tour. They had shared a genuine expedition—one full of meals, museums, laughter, mechanical ingenuity, and the quiet determination that has always kept Model A drivers moving forward. Three cars had left Columbus, two came home under their own power, and all six travelers returned with a story worth telling again and again.

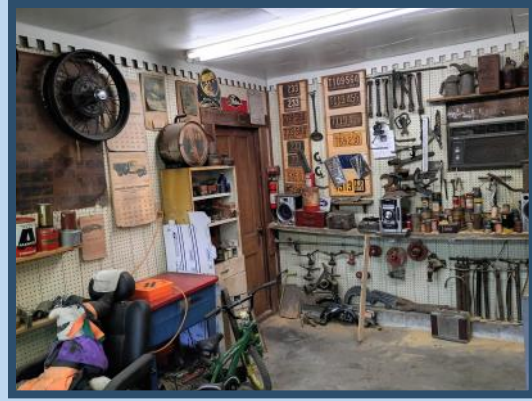

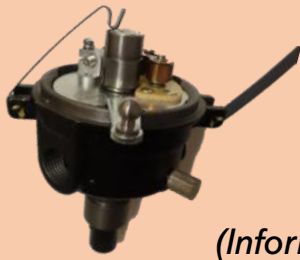

FORD MODEL "A" TECHNICAL TIPS

Check these items out On a new or rebuilt distributor

(Information from the Sanat Anita Model A Club Website)



This month I had two incidents of Model A distributor failure and am grateful to the assistance rendered by our President Tim Diehn. It turned out that the rebuilt distributor I purchased wasn't properly reamed or lubricated. Another lesson learned...John Emmering



1. Check Proper Reaming & Fit (Shaft-to-Bushing Clearance)

Side Play: The shaft must have **zero** side-to-side movement in the body. Push on the cam side-to-side; if you see the points gap open/close, the bushings are too loose or improperly reamed.

Reaming/Fit: The shaft should rotate freely 360 degrees without binding, but not be loose. The ideal clearance between the shaft and bushing is tight, around .001" to .002".

Rotor-to-Body Gap: Check that the rotor-to-body contact gap is approximately .025".

Upper Plate Stability: Ensure the upper plate does not wobble, which can cause erratic point gaps.

2. Lubrication Check

Oiler Passage: Rebuilt units often have blocked oil passages. Ensure the oiler hole leads down to the shaft, particularly for the top bushing.

Drilled Shaft (Recommended): If possible, ensure the shaft and cam screw are drilled to allow oil to reach the upper bushing.

3. Lubrication Points:

Base Oiler: Fill the oiler on the side of the distributor body with motor oil.

Cam Lubrication: Apply a *small* amount of cam lube or Vaseline to the cam lobes. Do not over-lube, or oil will reach the points and cause misfiring.

Top Shaft: Add a few drops of motor oil to the top of the cam screw.

4. Final Assembly Check

Points Setting: Set point gap to .018-.020".

End Play: The shaft should have minimal up-and-down movement (end play). It should be under .003".

5. Electrical Test: Ensure the point stud does not short against the distributor body.

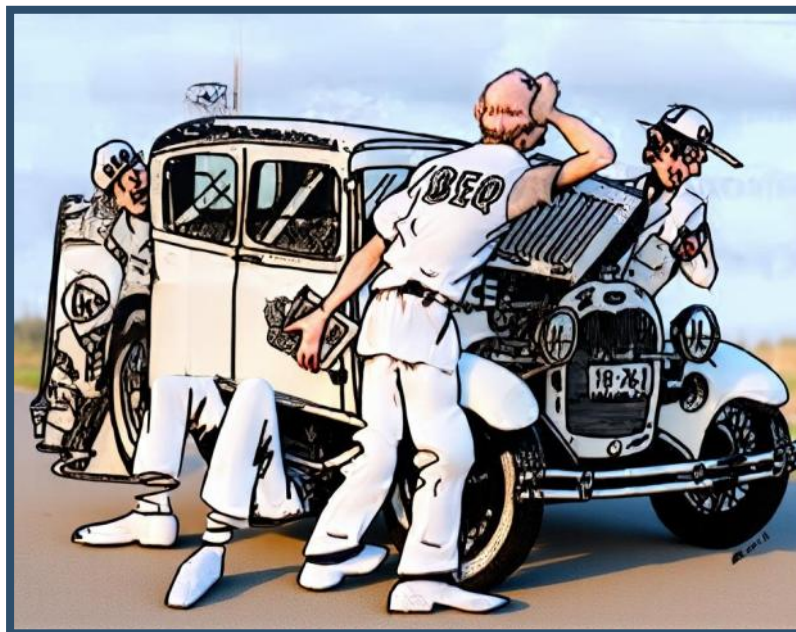
