# IN-IL-KY-TN TRIP – Oct 14 to Oct 22, 2022

On Friday morning, Oct 14, the initial group met at McDonald's in Bloomington. # Fall Foliage Tour, Oldenburg, IN—October 29th Submitted by Linda Sullivan

October 29 was warm and sunny, a perfect day for a Fall Foliage Tour. Ten Model A's and two modern cars joined Jack and Linda Sullivan for a tour thru Franklin, Rush and Shelby counties.

In Franklin county we crossed our first covered bridge on our way to Oldenburg and lunch at Wagners restaurant. Oldenburg has a unique skyline with its many church steeples.

Our next stop was a cemetery at Milory in Rush county where Jack and Linda pointed out zink grave markers. They were only produced for a short time but dot cemeteries across the country. Their blueish appearance, near perfect condition, and removable panels make them easy to recognize. As we crossed the Forsythe covered bridge, built in 1888, we wondered how many Model A's had crossed the bridge before us.

Meltzer Woods located in Shelby county was the perfect spot for a maple cookie stop. It is a 60 acre old growth forest with some trees dating back to the 1600's. We honored a favorite fall tradition with a stop for apples and cider at Harker Orchard.

After backtracking to Rush county we crossed the Moscow Covered Bridge. It was originally built bu the Kennedy family in 1886. In June 2008 a tornado sent the span crashing in the Flat Rock River. Donations came from across the state and the bridge was rebuilt by Dan Collom using 40% of the original timbers.

After a pit stop at a travel center, friends said their good byes and headed to their home counties.
