
The board continues to meet monthly via Zoom. If you have something to bring up please address it with our board members.





## Amish Tour to Berlin, Ohio

We had twelve cars participate in the trip to Amish country in Ohio. We had a most enjoyable two days touring through picturesque Amish countryside. We saw several sheep, chickens, cows, and of course, horses. More than once we were entertained by horses frolicking with each other, racing and playing in the pastures.



One of the first stops was at a very large cheese production facility. This shop/outlet probably had well over two hundred kinds of cheeses. Most everyone bought something. Some cheese was aged over two years and some we never knew existed. A large 30 foot mural explained the origins of cheese making, including how it was accidentally developed and the shared ways of manufacturing throughout the world. There were at least six 1000 gallon vats that were in various stages of production of different kinds of cheese.

Next we visited a family owned leather shop where they were making horse collars. It certainly took a lot of work to produce a single collar. Of course, the show collars made of patent leather were considerably more expensive than those made for working on the farm. Several sizes were on display. Many colors and thicknesses of leather were described as having different purposes for various products. Belts, purses, phone caddies, pillows, key chains, vests, hats, pillows and other items made there were available for purchase.

By the time that informative stop was over, everyone was ready for a homemade Amish meal. Our expectations were certainly met with delightful satisfaction. The mashed potatoes made with sour cream and butter were a favorite. Homemade bread topped with a peanut butter/marshmallow spread delighted all. Lemonade was refreshing with fresh fried chicken and homemade sausage from their own raised pigs. Green beans from their garden and freshly made noodles just about filled everyone. Then seconds were served. Just in case there was any room left, pie was available. It seems like everyone found a little room for that with coffee.

Then, on to a wonderful furniture store. Many tables and desks were on display. As you know "live edge" tables are in vogue. Some tops were a single board, four feet wide and six or more feet long. Beautiful wood doesn't adequately describe the wonderful variety of surprises we saw.

From there the Lehman's hardware visit brought back many memories by viewing the thousands of antiques on display. Tools, machinery, household items and goods were abundant and a source of much discussion. One could purchase a new copper kettle over 3 feet in diameter. It certainly was a full day.

Day two started with visiting an antique store adjacent to the hotel. Most everyone there wanted to spend more time there but we had a pressing engagement with the "Age Of Steam Roundhouse". This 1-1/2 hour guided tour presented about twenty steam engines in various stages of restoration.



All were different. Features of each were explained and questions adequately answered giving us insight into this unique experience. A full sized roundhouse and functional turntable



complete with water towers and smoky aroma brought to life this "age of steam". Again we were treated to another Amish meal. It was different but just as delicious as the first.



Keim Lumber was our next stop. The time needed to experience everything to see was inadequate. Much live edge lumber was on display and available to purchase. We are talking *LARGE* boards and hundreds of them. One that was a surprise to many was lignum vitae, it is both the heaviest and hardest wood in the world. Among other uses, it is used for propeller shaft bearings in large ships. Having been exploited to the brink of extinction, it is now an endangered species and very expensive.

This day concluded with a meal in a restaurant adjacent to the hotel. If you were unable to join us this year, we missed your company and will return in a few years.




